The same challenge appears when there isn't a clear approach to how AI should be used across the business.

Employees want to know what they're allowed to use, what information can be shared, and where the boundaries are.

Without clear guidance, many people become cautious. Others simply make up their own rules.

Getting the best results from AI usually means changing the way work gets done, not only adding new software.

Give people permission to experiment, create clear ownership, and build AI into existing processes rather than leaving it as an optional extra.

AI is moving into workplaces quickly.

Giving people the skills, confidence, and guidance to use it well may turn out to be as important as the technology itself.

did you know...

there's a flaw in Hide My Email?



Apple's Hide My Email feature was designed to let people sign up for websites and services without revealing their real email address. It's to help protect privacy and reduce spam.

But a recently discovered flaw could let cyber criminals uncover the real email address hidden behind an anonymous one.

Apple is aware, and is working on a fix, but don't treat any technology as completely foolproof.

In the 1990s, Microsoft had a secret weapon for making Windows feel faster on modest hardware. Engineers used an internal tool nicknamed “Microsoft Lego” that would take chunks of code inside Windows and rearrange them so the parts the computer needed most were stored closer together. The software still did the same job, but it loaded faster and felt more responsive because the PC spent less time hunting around for the code it needed.

The first 5MB hard drive was released in 1956 and weighed around 2,000 pounds. It took up 16 square feet of floor space and used 50 giant 24-inch platters to store its data. Accessing information took around 600 milliseconds, which felt fast at the time. For comparison, a modern smartphone photo can easily be larger than 5MB, and your phone probably has enough storage to hold the equivalent of millions of these early hard drives in your pocket.

Before there was Google, there was Archie. It launched on 10th September 1990 and was the world’s first internet search engine. The World Wide Web hadn’t even been invented yet. Instead, Archie acted more like a giant contents page for the early internet, making it easier to track down files hidden away on servers around the world.

You may never use these features, but they make Windows a more flexible platform for the tools your business relies on every day.

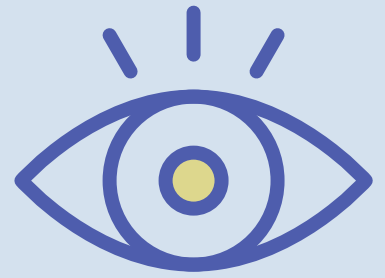

Microsoft will make your screen more comfortable

Microsoft is testing a new Windows 11 feature called Screen Tint. It's designed to make long days in front of a monitor a little easier on the eyes.

Unlike Night Light, which changes the colour temperature of your display, Screen Tint adds a soft colour overlay across the whole screen.

You can choose from preset colours or create your own and adjust the strength of the effect to suit you.

It could be a simple way to reduce eye strain and make screens feel more comfortable to use throughout the day.

Hidden Windows 11 features that save time every week

Most people only use a small fraction of what their computer can do.

Are you guilty of that?

You find the tools you need, settle into your routines, and get on with running the business.

Take Remote Desktop, for example.

If you have a main computer in the office but occasionally work from home, travel, or spend time in different locations, Windows 11 Pro can let you connect back to that machine and use it almost as if you were sitting in front of it.

If you've ever found yourself emailing documents to yourself or trying to remember which laptop contains the latest version of a file, you can see the appeal.

Another feature worth knowing about is BitLocker To Go.

The name sounds intimidating, but the idea is simple.

It lets you password-protect USB sticks and external hard drives, so if one goes

missing, the information stored on it stays protected.

If you regularly move presentations, customer files, photos, or backups around on removable drives, that's a useful extra layer of security.

Windows 11 Pro also gives you more control over updates.

Ever had your computer decide that now is the perfect moment to restart halfway through an important piece of work?

You'll appreciate being able to choose when updates happen instead of letting your PC decide for you (but remember, updates are important, so don't put them off indefinitely).

And if you've set up several laptops for new starters, replacement devices, or a growing team, Windows can help there too.

Features like provisioning packages let settings and configurations be copied across automatically. That saves you from repeating the same setup process again and again.

All helpful little features that remove small frustrations from your working day.

And that can be where the biggest productivity gains come from.
